JJC can provide numerous benefits to the community

- 1. Establishing a juvenile justice plan will handle juvenile justice related issues at all the decision making stages.
- 2. Collaboration between the various stakeholders who have responsibility for juvenile justice concerns in their respective jurisdictions.
- 3. Assessment of juvenile issues within the community to determines the best process for resolving these issues.
- 4. Community collaboration
- 5. Increased funding opportunities though identifying needs and pooling resources.

The establishment of a JJC helps individuals determine the needs of the children in the community through collaboration with other stakeholders, including but not limited to the State's Attorney, Judges, Probation Officers, the Sheriff and community members.
